Welcome to our monthly newsletter, which will keep you up to date on what we're doing to keep communities safe in Colchester. It will focus on:

- The work of the Community Policing Team and Local Policing Team

The Community Policing Team includes the Town Centre Proactive Team. Their work includes responding to issues and carrying out proactive work, including public engagement, crime prevention, crime disruption, and safeguarding vulnerable people. The teams include specialist Missing Persons and Children'and Young Person officers, who work with partners in education and social care to protect vulnerable people from harm.

The Local Policing Team's main role is to respond to calls for assistance from members of the public, but they also carry out proactive patrols.

Our Colchester community and local policing officers are supported by detectives working in the Criminal Investigation Department, Domestic Abuse Investigation Team, and Crime and Public Protection Command. They investigate the more serious crimes that occur in north Essex, safeguard victims and bring offenders to justice.

Our priorities —in partnership with the Community Safety Partnership—mirror the Essex Police Force Plan for 2020/21

Colchester has a very clear focus on:

Violence – disrupting those who commit serious organised crime and to dismantle the supply of controlled drugs in the district. We will target those who carry knives and commit violence, ensuring Colchester remains a safe place for all.

Vulnerability – we will ensure we engage with our communities to understand their needs and deliver policing to safeguard those who are vulnerable in our community.

Victims – we will provide victims with a first-class service.

Visibility – we will be visible in our communities to provide reassurance and reduce the fear of crime.

Working with partners to tackle ASB

Throughout this month we have continued to work with our partner agencies to tackle Anti– Social Behaviour. As you can see in this photograph we have worked with Colchester Borough Homes in seeking a closure notice for a property in Shrub End, Colchester following continued reports regarding the address. A closure notice is designed to prevent the Anti Social Behaviour from occurring and in essence "closes" a property. Restrictions on such orders can vary but generally the conditions are that only the occupant and in some cases, nobody is allowed on the premises other than a police officer to check for compliance. A really helpful tool in reducing ASB in our neighbourhoods and making area's far more enjoyable for you to live.

It is always nice to receive some feedback—especially when it is positive so here is an email we were grateful to receive this month following reports of a group of rough sleepers causing issues close to the Abbey Fields Medical Centre—



I would just like to express my sincere gratitude to PC Mond for all her help and support with the rough sleepers.

PC Mond was hugely empathetic and worked hard to find solutions for both us and the rough sleepers – she listened, garnered information and was sympathetic to all parties – the practice, Diabetic Eye Screening, patients and the rough sleepers. PC Monds pragmatic approach meant that we have been able to find a way forward whilst keeping everyone happy.

I witnessed PC Mond speaking to the rough sleepers – she is firm but fair but in a way which enabled them to maintain their dignity and self respect - hats off to her she has brilliant communication skills.

Also the team here were really appreciative for all that she has done.

Support is available to rough sleepers through our weekly multi agency OP Luscombe meetings. In our first OP Luscombe session following lockdown, working with our partners we managed to house a rough sleeper after 24 hours of her visiting us. This shows how all of the agencies really do pull together and try their best to help.

Tackling County Lines

Over the past couple of months we have made a number of arrests in Colchester and London regarding county lines being run into Colchester.

A notable recent court result is from a routine stop of a vehicle in Colchester which had two men from London within.

Our officers become suspicious and utilised their powers under stop and search, finding over 200 wraps of Class A drugs, an estimated street value of £4,000.

Both men were arrested, charged and remanded in custody whereby the pleaded guilty the following day.

The men were sentenced to over 11 years between them. A reminder that if you leave your house to deal drugs, it may be several years before you return home to your family.

Policing the Town Centre

This coming week will see a further reduction of the restriction on our town centre, meaning our bars, restaurants, pubs and clubs will be getting somewhere back to "normal".

This seems a perfect time to remind everyone to be responsible if you are enjoying a night out and to drink responsibly. We will continue to work with our partners to ensure the town centre is a safe place at night, however please remember where you are unlikely to have had a night out in a long time, that your body may not respond to alcohol consumption as it did pre lockdown and your drunken behaviour could lead you to one of our cells!

Here are some tips for having a safe and enjoyable night out-

1. Safety in numbers - Always stay within a group when possible. By remaining close to the people you trust and know well, you'll reduce the risk of being targeted by people who are up to no good and could be out to take advantage.

2. Get taxis or arrange a lift- When traveling at night always book a taxi or get a lift with someone you trust. It's worth that little extra expense to take a ride in a cab and get home safely. Don't be tempted to get into an unlicensed cab for a quicker ride home.

4. Drink in moderation & watch your drink- Always stay in control when drinking alcohol. Know your limits and never push them. A few more drinks may seem like fun at the time, but it is never a good idea. Keep a close eye on your drinks and never leave them unattended at any point.

5. Stay in well-lit areas- If walking home after a night out, always stay in well-lit areas where there are plenty of people. People are less likely to commit crime if there is good lighting, CCTV and people around to see what is



happening. Always plan a route home and make sure you stick to places you know. Never take short cuts, especially down dark allies, by canals or through unlit parks.

6. Keep away from hostile situations -Don't be a hero on a night out. If there is a fight or an argument stay out of it and get help from door staff or the police.

As a community policing team we look forward to supporting our local businesses in re-opening.





CYP UPDATE

As schools come to a close we know that many children will be out and about during the summer meeting new people and creating new friendships. We must highlight the risks around new relationships and how when they go online dangers arise. We have investigated numerous incidents throughout the year of young people sharing explicit images of themselves. These can then be used to exploit or coerce the sender into doing something they do not want to.



Ensure you have the chat with your children around shar-

ing images of themselves and the harm that can be caused. Not only will the receiver be committing offences but



the sender is also committing an offence as they are sharing an image of a child. We are always there to assist any person who becomes a victim of revenge porn or is being coerced with the threat of sharing such an image. If you have any concerns around images you have seen on your child's phone please do contact us.

It isn't just the people our children meet while out and about we need to have concerns and conversations about with our

children. Children often meet new friends online, through gaming, social media or other means. Just because the person they are speaking to seems like another child, or acts like one, doesn't mean they are one. They may even send your children photographs of 'themselves' to gain trust however there are far to many cases whereby the person in the photographs are not the person you are speaking to.

The Essex Safegaurding Children Board have just done a week of online safety tips and awareness and through their website there are a number of resources for parents and children to learn how to be safe online. In a world where technology develops so quickly, these tips can help make a difference in ensuring your child is safe online.

Yesterday afternoon officers were patrolling #colchester High Street when they noticed a male acting suspiciously. The behaviour seen by the officers led to them utilising their stop and search powers. Following the search a 20 year old male from London was arrested on suspicion of being concerned in the supply of Class A drugs.

Officers continued the investigation throughout the night and have now charged the arrested male with three offences. He was remanded in custody and will appear at Colchester Magistrates court today.

I know, I know, it's another post about E-scooters from Essex Police and to pre-empt the inevitable "haven't you got anything better to do with your time ? "comments. To be blunt, yes, we do have other things we could be doing but the message around E-Scooters doesn't seem to be getting through to some people and so we need to reinforce our messaging to keep our roads as safe as we can.

Up to this point we have only been seizing E-scooters where they are being driven Illegally i.e. without insurance in public. But going forward we will now be issuing tickets for fines and points on your Driving Licence for traffic offences as well as seizing the E-scooter.

If you don't have a driving licence yet you could find that you will already have points on your licence before you even sit your test.

Officers from #Colchester community policing team deployed on Project Servator at various locations in the town yesterday

Using the Special training they received as Project Servator officers and the metal detector arch the officers were able to identify those who had something to hide and went out of their way to avoid speaking to the officers.

As a result 1 male was arrested for failing to appear at court, 1 male interviewed for possession of drugs and 1 illegal eScooter was seized. Project Servator aims to DETER, DETECT and DISRUPT a range of criminal activity including terrorism and knife crime, while providing reassurance for the public.

New Legislation

From the 14th July 2021 it has become against the law to possess certain weapons within your home which you could previously own. The below poster details some of the changes and the website you can find further information.

We take a zero tolerance approach to those who carry and use weapons on our streets and this new piece of legislation will provide us with more powers to keep you safe .

If you collect weapons for decoration or as collector items please make sure you are aware of what you can legally possess.

We previously published details of a scheme being run by the government to dispose of such items. If you are still in possession of now Illegal items please ensure there safe disposal.



The Offensive Weapons Act 2019

- It is now illegal to possess certain weapons in private places, including your home. This includes items such as knuckledusters, flick knives and telescopic truncheons.
- There will also be changes to the process of buying knives online with enhanced age verification checks at point of sale and collection/delivery.
- Please store and dispose of knives safely to reduce the risk of them being used as weapons.
- Help prevent knife crime by reporting any concerns, including about how they are sold, to the Police or anonymously to Crimestoppers.
