COURT SUCCESS FOR RET

RET have successfully prosecuted two males for day time poaching after they were caught trespassing with dogs on private land in Uttlesford..



David Hilden and Tyron Young had travelled to north Essex from south London in order to hunt rabbits with dogs. The team successfully applied for a dog prohibition order under new enhanced sentencing powers available to Magistrates. For the first time in England, both have been banned from keeping dogs for 3 years.

Courts were given tougher sentencing powers for offences involving hunting or poaching with dogs. To have achieved the first use of a dog prohibition order in England is a huge success for the team, and hurts those that seek to harm wildlife in our county.


The aim of the meeting was to discuss current wildlife legislation, how it could be improved and what issues we face enforcing wildlife crime in England.

RET gave examples of our good working relationship with the Crown Prosecution Service and partners.



Many partner agencies also attended, including national leads from the RSPCA, Zoological Society London, Nottingham University, NatureWatch and 4Paws as well as the Metropolitan Police Wildlife Unit.

ANIMALS SAFEGUARDED

During February the team dealt with several stray animals. Over the month three unregistered horses were recovered. These were eventually returned to rightful owners once they had been microchipped as required by law.



Also rescued from a main road was a very underfed, unwanted dog. Looked after by RET, she was fed and watered and is now being looked after by the council dog warden.
